How to add your entry to the [Kentucky Woman Suffrage Project Bibliography page](#):

1. Make sure you are logged in to H-Net and subscribed to H-Kentucky (see [directions on H-Kentucky network for step-by-step directions](#)).
2. Make sure your H-Net profile includes your name and institution or organization affiliation.
3. Copy the template below into a new document for you to use when you are ready to copy-and-paste into a new discussion post or a new link on H-Kentucky.
4. When your entry is ready, go to H-Kentucky (<http://networks.h-net.org/h-kentucky>) to submit your entry.
 - a. If your entry is not accessible via the web, click the orange button "**Start a Discussion.**" Paste your entry into the "Description" text box.
 - b. If your entry is a digital record, e.g., an item in World Cat or Google Books, choose the "**Links**" tab at the top of the page and click on the orange button "Add a Link."
5. Enter the title of the new post (or link) - which is the bibliographic citation itself. Please use Chicago Manual of Style (or Turabian) format for a bibliography. A quick guide and examples are available at http://www.chicagomanualofstyle.org/tools_citationguide.html.

6. Choose the **best terms** to classify your entry as a particular research source (primary, secondary or tertiary).
7. Add **keywords** related to your entry's content. Click "preview" then "submit to editor."
8. You will receive an email notification when your post has been published. If revisions are requested, please click on the link in the notification email, read the editor's comments, and respond accordingly.
